Course Overview

DESCRIPTION:

This hybrid preaching lab is designed for and limited to MDiv students enrolled in RTS Orlando's Distance MDiv degree program. Prerequisites: Communication I (02PT5100, 2 hrs), Preaching Lab 1 (02PT5125, 2 hrs). This course is 2 credit hours.

PURPOSE:

The purpose of this course is to apply the principles of sermon preparation and delivery learned in Communication I and applied in Preaching Lab 1 by preaching Christ-centered expository sermons and receiving peer and professor feedback as well as hearing and providing feedback to peers.

GOALS:

- Comprehension
 - To increase your knowledge of the core expository sermon preparation process.
 - To familiarize you with the particular requirements of preparing short occasional addresses and of preaching on Psalms and the Gospels.
- Competence
 - To further develop your ability to research, compose, and deliver expository sermons.
 - To develops the skills necessary for preaching on Psalms, prophets and Old Testament historical books.
- Character
 - To grow in your self-knowledge and self-confidence as you preach and receive feedback.
 - To grow in your reliance upon prayer and the Holy Spirit during sermon preparation and preaching.

Course Requirements

OVERVIEW

Students will preach and video record three expository sermons then upload those recordings to Canvas for viewing and feedback by the instructor and fellow students. Instructors will hold live Zoom meetings once a week. Student providentially hindered from participating in those sessions will have access to session video recordings.

STUDENT TO INSTRUCTOR INTRODUCTION

By the date indicated on the schedule, complete the student-to-professor introduction.

ZOOM CLASS SESSIONS

The instructor will conduct Zoom class sessions as indicated on the course schedule above. These sessions will be for him to communicate expectations regarding your sermons, provide guidance on preaching the biblical genres assigned and wisdom on preaching in general, and provide general feedback on class sermons. You will receive a Zoom meeting invitation for each session which will provide you the link to join the session. For anyone providentially hindered from participating in a session, the recordings of those sessions will be made available after the session has concluded.

EVALUATION FORMS

Your course web page will have an evaluation form for the expository sermons. These forms are to be used to guide the feedback you give to one another.

SERMON VIDEO RECORDINGS & FEEDBACK

Once you have video recorded each of your sermons, you are to upload them to Canvas by the dates indicated. Late submissions will disadvantage your classmates who need to view and give feedback. Therefore, late submissions will incur a grade penalty.

As your classmates make their recordings available on Canvas, watch them, complete the feedback form, upload the form to the relevant assignment, then provide a brief summary comment on the discussion forum for that sermon. Your discussion comment should consist of a) the sermon thesis (big idea) you heard; b) the main point outline you heard; and c) a summary of your feedback to your classmate, being sure to provide encouragements and suggestions.

EXPOSITORY SERMONS

You will preaching one 30-minute sermon each on a passage from Psalms, an Old Testament prophet, and an Old Testament historical book (not in the Pentateuch). You may request instructor approval for your sermon scripture texts, but each one is subject to instructor approval and you will be assigned passages if you do not request them.

All three 30-minute (maximum) sermons are to exhibit the qualities of a good expository sermon as learned in Comm1 and Lab 1. Your instructor will go into greater detail, but these qualities include:

- A clear thesis (big idea) which faithfully proclaims your scripture text with a clear call to action based on the truth of the text.
- A clear main point outline which develops and argues the sermon thesis in which there is clear and convincing exposition of your points; helpful, legitimate application based on the text; and appropriate and helpful illustrations.
- A clear Christ focus, whether developed throughout or at a particular point, legitimately based on the text which makes the sermon redemptive in its thrust.

By the date indicated, upload for your instructor a Word, RTF, or PDF manuscript and your sermon video recording to the relevant assignments on Canvas.

After your classmates have provided feedback on the discussion forum you are to read that feedback and provide a response that acknowledges that feedback.

You are free to preach from your manuscript, although this may be a good opportunity to try to preach from reduced notes or an outline. This is your opportunity to "really preach" by exhibiting conviction and being application rich.

CANVAS INTERACTIONS

The course format requires a certain number of interactions between you and the instructor and you and your classmates. Your sermon feedback and responses to that feedback fulfill these requirements. Therefore, it's necessary that you complete all of them in order to receive full credit.

- Assignments submitted after their deadlines will be penalized accordingly unless prior permission for late submission was granted.
