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Course Objectives:

1. To understand the overarching mission of the church, and how preaching and teaching fits into and serves this larger mission.
2. To understand the daunting (dare I say, impossible) nature of the teacher/preacher's task, and the absolute dependence one must have on the supernatural content and power of the Ordinary Means of Grace (particularly for this course, the Word of God and Prayer) if one's teaching/preaching is to be truly fruitful.
3. To understand the need for the preacher/teacher to be continually affected and transformed by the Word that is taught/preached; being a person of continual repentance, faith in Christ, and new obedience.
4. To understand the fundamental nature of preaching and the calling on the preacher from the Scriptures.
5. To develop greater facility in studying the Bible, so that one can consistently ascertain the basic structure and primary emphasis(es) of a given Biblical text in its larger context.
6. To develop greater facility in seeing how Christ is proclaimed from every text in the New Testament.
7. To develop greater facility in preparing sermons in which the content and emphasis of the sermon is in conformity with the content and emphasis of the Biblical text, in which Christ is faithfully and organically preached from the text in question, and from which faithful and practical application of the text is made to the lives of the listener.
8. To help students take further steps in "finding their own voice" as a preacher and teacher by exploring various rhetorical styles and modes of presentation.
9. To develop greater facility in listening to sermons, both for spiritual nourishment and for pedagogical considerations.
10. To analyze other's reflections/instruction on preaching and determine the relative value and priority of such instruction.

September 26: The Preacher's Task: Making Application, Rhetorical Organization, Illustration, Finding Your Own Voice; Student Expositions of 2 Timothy 4:1-8, 4:9-22

Course Assignments and Grade Structure:

50% Class Participation (Attendance, General Engagement, Expositions)

50% Final Writing Assignment. Due September 26. Answer the following question: "If you had a friend who was sensing a call to a preaching ministry, and you had to recommend only one of our course texts (Lloyd Jones or Chapell), which one would you recommend and why?" Paper should interact with both texts, pointing out key strengths and weakness of each work, and making an argument for why one particular work is the most beneficial "first book on preaching." (5 page limit).

Articulation (oral & written)	Broadly understands and articulates knowledge, both oral and written, of essential biblical, theological, historical, and cultural/global information, including details, concepts, and frameworks. Also includes ability to preach and teach the meaning of Scripture to both heart and mind with clarity and enthusiasm.	Strong	Every student will not only receive instruction on principles of Biblical exposition, but will engage in formal public exposition of Biblical passages before classmates and the instructor.
Scripture	Significant knowledge of the original meaning of Scripture. Also, the concepts for and skill to research further into the original meaning of Scripture and to apply Scripture to a variety of modern circumstances. (Includes appropriate use of original languages and hermeneutics; and integrates theological, historical, and cultural/global perspectives.)	Strong	The heart of the course involves instruction on the nature of Scripture and proper techniques for studying the Scripture so as to rightly ascertain its meaning
