

Course description.

Pastoral Ministry (02PT5250) will lay the foundations of a biblical theology of the pastor in relation to the church and the world. Students will begin to formulate a philosophy of ministry, assess readiness, and attain progress in their calling. A variety of pastoral skills and competencies will be included. 2 hours.

Course objectives.

Knowing:

- A sense of the scope of God's purposes for his people, the church, particularly as it pertains to the role of the minister.
- Overview of biblical qualifications and functions of the ministry.
- Historical survey of the office of minister of word and sacrament.
- Recognition & development of a ministry framework out of which to develop and implement a philosophy of ministry.

Being:

- Conviction regarding the church's identity and purpose.
- Conviction regarding the role of minister of word and sacrament.
- Commitment to character and gift development of a minister of word and sacrament.
- Clarity and commitment about sense of calling in relation to readiness for ministry.
- Commitment to carry out the challenges of applying biblical norms for ministry to contemporary pastoral contexts.

Doing:

- Cultivation of spiritual habits necessary for entry into and flourishing in ministry.
- Formulation of learnings for implementation in actual ministry situation(s).

Student to Professor Introduction

By the date indicated in the syllabus please complete the "Student to Professor Introduction" on Canvas.

Class participation & contribution

Assessment will be based on presence and participation by asking and responding to questions when asked. This will include questions on the reading due that week. If you are not able to answer a question asked of you, you will get one more opportunity that same class to receive credit.

Homework assignments

Approximately every other week assignments will be made to a) reflect upon class material or b) prepare for an upcoming class session.

Assessment of calling

In a 3,000 word paper (+/- 500 words), describe the mission of the church and the shape of pastoral calling in relation to it based on the lectures and reading and assess your own sense of call as it stands at the end of the semester. Additionally, you must get written feedback from your pastor and, if married, your spouse. Assessment will be based on how the course content on the church's mission and the shape of pastoral ministry are described and the thoughtfulness of your reflection in relation to them. Content of this paper will be discussed further at various points during the semester.

Family worship / spiritual formation project

Married students-family worship.

This assignment will build your experience and conviction about family worship. Based on the instructions given in the first week's lecture and from the reading in Helopoulos and the Westminster Directory for Family Worship, you will conduct family worship at least twice per week for ten weeks. At the end of each week you will complete the graded discussion assignment describing your family worship for that week. You will need to provide the following information each week:

- What days you had family worship.
- A general description of what you did each time.
- What went well and what was most challenging?

Since the purpose of this assignment is to reinforce a habit, you will not be able to catch up if you get behind. The week before fall reading week and the final week of classes you are to read and respond to two peers.

Single students

You are free to do the family worship assignment with a small group. If you choose this option, please let me know. Otherwise, you will do an individual spiritual formation assignment based on Psalms.

After reading Bonhoeffer's *Psalms: Prayerbook of the Bible* and Luther's *A Simple Way to Pray*, at least twice weekly for ten weeks meditate on a psalm of your choosing and then compose a prayer that prays that psalm. For each psalm you choose, note the genre of the psalm, the primary imagery, a key verse, and a one sentence summary. Take that knowledge into consideration as you write the prayer. Each week you will complete the graded discussion assignment by uploading your notes and prayers.

This assignment is well-suited to writing by hand, but typed or handwritten assignments are acceptable.

Since the purpose of this assignment is to reinforce a habit, you will not be able to catch up if you get behind. The week before fall reading week and the final week of classes you are to read and respond to two peers.

Course materials

Printed lecture handouts and other materials will be made available on a weekly basis in class.

After singing the psalm of the day smart phones should be silenced and placed out of sight unless you need to be available for urgent personal (e.g., you or your spouse is ≥8 months pregnant) or professional (e.g., you are a member of Seal Team 6) reasons. Please notify me ahead of time if this applies to you.

Bring a printed Bible to class. If you place it next to you, you can reflexively grab it instead of your smart phone during distractedness episodes.

Class recordings

Students with a diagnosed learning disability or for whom English is a second language will be given access to lecture audio recordings for the entire semester. Other students who are providentially hindered from attending class may request the recordings on an as-needed basis when providing the reasons for their absence

Class protocols

Class will start promptly on the hour and break 5-10 minutes halfway through. Please arrive on time, return from break promptly, and stay seated throughout the class unless for urgent reasons you must leave quietly. You are free to stand in the back during class.
