This course constitutes an introduction to the language of Biblical (Classical) Hebrew, including basic phonology, morphology, syntax, and vocabulary. Hebrew 1 counts for three (3) credit hours. No prerequisites.

- 2. **Attendance.** Language acquisition can be a difficult task and requires constant vigilance in the beginning stages. Students are required to attend all class and to be on time for every session. A class is comprised of three, two-hour sessions.
- 3. **Method of Instruction**. The emphasis in this class is student performance. Students must come to class prepared and ready to participate in the instructional process. This means that all the assigned reading from the grammar and all the assigned Classwork from the workbook must be completed and corrected* by the beginning of the class period for which it is assigned. See class formats under course schedule.
- 4. **Special Needs**. In order to ensure full class participation, any student with a disabling condition requiring special accommodations (e.g. tape recorders, special adaptive equipment) is strongly encouraged to contact the professor at the beginning of the course.
- 5. **Electronic Aids**. No computers, recording devices, or electronics are permitted in class for non-remote students. Remote students will require access to a computer (or iPad) with video capability (web camera).
- 6. **Disclaimer**. This syllabus is intended to reflect the learning objectives, instructional format, and other information necessary for students to appraise the course. However, during the course of the semester, the instructor reserves the right to modify any portion of this syllabus as may appear necessary.

Course Requirements

- 1. **Homework**. Homework will be assigned for every chapter. The homework is assigned for the benefit of the student and must be completed before the class period for which it is assigned. You will have time in each block to work through the homework for the chapter covered. Homework is not collected or graded.
- 2. **Quizzes**. Starting the second weekend a block of quizzes will be taken over the lessons taught, and the homework assigned the previous week. A brief time will be given to answer any final questions over the homework before the block of quizzes. Due to the very nature of learning a language, quizzes are cumulative. For example, October 16th students will take a block of quizzes consisting of Ch. 1, Ch. 2, Ch. 3 (Each chapter is graded separately, so this is 3 quizzes). There will be 16 quizzes total, given in 5 blocks. There are no make-up quizzes, but the two lowest quizzes will be dropped. Quizzes constitute 70% of the term grade.
- 3. **Tests**. There will be three major examinations this fall term (see schedule below). All exams are cumulative and will be taken on Canvas by the given date. Total exam scores constitute 30% of the term grade (Exam 1 = 5%; Exam 2 = 10% Exam 3 = 15%).
- 4. Scripture memory verse must be learned in Hebrew along with its translation for each weekend following the first weekend. Verses will be on every block of quizzes and tests. See Calendar.
- 5. Class Attendance. Attendance is required.
