COURSE SCHEDULE

COURSE OVERVIEW

DESCRIPTION:

REGISTRATION FOR THIS COURSE MUST BE COMPLETED BY November 29, the first day of the course. This is a HYBRID COURSE that will incorporate e-learning components prior to the on-campus class dates. Course activities start the week of December 2. Prerequisite is Communication 1. 2 credits.

A continuation of Communication I (02PT508), this course is designed to review and refine expository preaching skills as well as cover a variety of topics related to preaching, occasional sermons and addresses, preaching Christ from all parts of scripture, some broader aspects of communication within a ministry environment, and the impact of information technologies upon identity, social relationships, and communication (i.e. media ecology).

GOALS:

- Comprehension
 - To learn the purpose, goals and methods of preparing occasional sermons.
 - To learn interpretively sound ways to preach Christ from the various biblical genres.
 - To understand the process of making gospel-centered, redemptive application in faithful expository sermons.
 - To make aware of the impact of information technologies on identity and spiritual formation.
- Competence

- To reinforce and strengthen your ability to preach expository, Christ-centered sermons.
- To provide experience in preparing occasional sermons.
- To lay foundations for effectively administering communion, weddings, and benedictions.
- Character
 - To enable you to preach more effectively by empathizing with a wide range of listeners.
 - To extend your sense of the scope and power of the gospel as it should be preached.
 - To strengthen your confidence in the sufficiency of scripture for ministry of the Word.

WORKFLOW

The optimal way to learn in this course is to do the readings, recorded lectures, and interactions during the week and do the assignments near the end of the week or on Saturday. This is because the former provide the basis for reflection and completion of the latter. It is difficult to assimilate the input from readings, lectures, and fellow students and complete the assignments satisfactorily on the same day. The pre-campus work can be lightened by completing the assigned readings before the course begins.

EXPOSITORY SERMON ASSIGNMENT

This assignment will provide review of basic principles of sermon development covered in Communication I and preaching labs. Your final submission will be a main proposition, main point outline, a sermon introduction, and manuscript for one of the main points.

<u>Part 1</u> consists of a) completing an exegetical worksheet; b) formulating a thesis (Big Idea), and c) developing a homiletical outline for an assigned scripture passage.

The week following the submission of Part 1 you are to read and interact with the work done by members of your sermon work group. The goal of your interaction is to encourage and assist fellow group members in developing the attributes of an expository sermon learned in Communication I and reinforced in the preaching labs. Toward the end of that week, you will receive professor feedback as well. You may revise your Part 1 submission based on this feedback.

<u>Part 2</u> will be your updated sermon outline, Big Idea, transitions plus a manuscript of the introduction, one of the main points of your choosing, and the conclusion for the sermon on the assigned scripture text. See the example provided for format. Assessment for this assignment will be made following submission of part 2, but will be based on parts 1 and 2 as well as interactions with fellow students in between.

WEDDING SERMON ASSIGNMENT

Based on the online lectures about weddings and wedding sermons as well as the assigned reading in Chapell, write a wedding sermon (<u>not</u> a wedding charge) of approximately ten minutes in length. Assessment will be based on the qualities of a good wedding sermon presented in the lectures and reading. An example is provided in the course materials.

FUNERAL SERMON ASSIGNMENT

Write a funeral sermon of not more than fifteen minutes following the criteria set forth in the recorded lectures and readings. Examples are provided in the course materials.

Communion, Wedding, & Benediction Memorization

On the due dates indicated you will have memorized the portions of the wedding and communion services and the benedictions provided in this syllabus and recited them to a grader of your choosing. The wedding and communion selections are from the *Book of Common Worship* (Philadelphia: Presbyterian Board of Publications, 1946). You may memorize the benedictions from the Bible translation of your choice. The benedictions to be memorized are:

Numbers 6:24-26 Romans 15:13 2 Corinthians 13:14 2 Thessalonians 3:16 Hebrews 13:20-21

After the grader has signed the form included in this syllabus, scan or photograph the form and upload it to complete the assignment. You must do this separately for each of the memorization assignments.

You may attempt to recite the assignments to your grader as many times as possible, but you must complete it with no more than minor errors without assistance or prompting from your grader.

You may memorize your benedictions from any sound scripture translation (e.g. ESV, NIV, NAS). If English is your second language, you may memorize a sound translation in your first language.

For the wedding and communion assignments, you may substitute an established form from another tradition or in your mother tongue if English is not your first language, but must consult with me before beginning memorization.

LOST ART OF DYING ASSIGNMENT

After listening to the lecture on funerals and reading Dugdale's *The Lost Art of Dying*, in a single-spaced paper of 2,000 words (+/-250) written for church members or seekers which, do the following. This is a pastoral paper in which tone and clarity of expression are essential.

- 1) Introductory paragraph explaining the purpose of the documents.
- 2) Synopsis of the problem Dr. Dugdale brings to light, including the reasons we face the problem.
- 3) A <u>summary</u> of the Bible's teaching on death and dying. <u>Be concise!</u>
- 4) What the ancient practice of *ars morendi* is and how your church body genuinely attempts to practice it.
- 5) The general practices of your and your church's approach to funerals, including a statement of what a funeral is.

6) Steps for the reader to take either seeking guidance or to join in the church's practice of ars morendi.

PRECIOUS REMEDIES ASSIGNMENT

Based on the class lectures on listening, application, and idolatry dynamics and your reading of Brooks' *Precious Remedies*, apply your learnings in the "cure of souls" by completing the following for the Brooks chapter assigned to you at the conclusion of our week on campus. A sample has been provided on Canvas.

- 1) Choose one of the devices listed in the chapter assigned to you.
- 2) Restate in clear <u>contemporary</u> terms both the general device of the chapter and the specific device you have chosen.
- 3) Drawing upon Brooks' remedies, state in clear contemporary terms what remedy/remedies you are choosing for your response.
- 4) Interrogation pose 3-4 questions which you might ask as part of a sermon which will articulate the particular device of Satan.
- 5) Explanation state the same device in an explanatory form, explaining what the thoughts of someone are when they experience it.
- 6) Solution explain the remedy(ies) in clear terms as you might in a sermon.
- 7) Application provide directions (application) which the remedy requires of those who are experiencing the device.

CHRIST-CENTERED EXPOSITION ASSIGNMENT

Based on the lectures and Greidanus reading, complete the work assignment worksheet regarding Christ-centered exposition. A sample has been provided on Canvas.

READING LIFE ASSIGNMENT

Based on the lecture on the pastor's reading life,

- 1) Describe a literary artifact you read in the past that made a lasting impact on you and what that impact is.
- 2) Based on the categories of reading described in the lecture, develop a list of planned future reading.

MEDIA ECOLOGY ASSIGNMENT

Based on the lectures on media ecology:

- 1) Identify your own situatedness regarding new media (not limited to social media). Mention at least one way in which you realize you are captive.
- 2) From the lecture bibliography, choose one book, one online video, and one article (print or online). For each of the three, write a 3-5 sentence description of what it is about and how it might be helpful to navigating the issues raised in the lectures. Note: You only need to read a minimum of 75 pages of the book.

3) Choosing a technology from contemporary life, analyze it by applying McLuhan's triad. This can be an example from your own life, what you have observed among Christians, or in the culture. Be concrete and clear about what you are describing.

COMMUNION & WEDDING SERVICES

WEDDING SERVICE

The following is the portion to be memorized from the order for solemnization of marriage from the Book of Common Worship (1946). Archaic expressions have been updated. It is formatted in order facilitate memorization.

Dearly beloved, we are assembled here in the presence of God, to join this Man and this Woman in holy marriage;

which is instituted of God, regulated by His commandments, blessed by our Lord Jesus Christ, and to be held in honor among all men.

Let us therefore reverently remember that God has established and sanctified marriage, for the welfare and happiness of mankind. Our Savior has declared that a man shall leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife.

By His apostles, He has instructed those who enter into this relation

to cherish a mutual esteem and love;

to bear with each other's infirmities and weaknesses;

to comfort each other in sickness, trouble, and sorrow;

in honesty and industry to provide for each other, and for their household, in temporal things;

to pray for and encourage each other in the things which pertain to God; and to live together as heirs of the grace of life.

[Man's/Woman's name], will you have this Woman/Man to be your wife, and will you pledge your faith to her,

in all love and honor, in all duty and service, in all faith and tenderness, to live with her, and cherish her, according to the ordinances of God, in the holy bond of marriage?

Who gives this woman to be married to this man?

. . .

Repeat after me.

I, [Name], take you, [Name], to be my wedded wife/husband. And I do promise and covenant;
Before God and these witnesses;
To be your leving and faithful busband/wife.

To be your loving and faithful husband/wife;

In plenty and in want;

In joy and in sorry; In sickness and in health; As long as we both shall live. With this ring I thee wed; In the name of the Father; And of the Son; And of the Holy Spirit.

Bless, O Lord, this ring, that he who gives it and she who wears it may be in Your peace, and continue in Your favor, until their life's end; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

By the authority committed to me as a Minister of the Church of Christ, I declare that [Name] and [Name] are now Husband and Wife, according to the ordinance of God, and the law of the State; in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Whom therefore God has joined together, let no man put asunder.

COMMUNION SERVICE

Beloved in the Lord, hear what gracious words our Savior Christ says to all who truly turn to Him:

[From a sound translation of your own choosing recite Matthew 11:28-30; John 6:35, 37b; Matthew 5:6]

Hear the Words of the Institution of the Holy Supper of our Lord Jesus Christ, as they are delivered to us by the Apostle Paul:

[Recite from a sound translation of your own choosing 1 Corinthians 11:23-26;]

As the Lord Jesus, the same night in which He was betrayed, took bread, I take these elements of bread and wine, to be set apart from all common uses to this holy use and mystery; and as He gave thanks and blessed, let us draw near to God, and present to Him our prayers and thanksgivings.

For in the night in which He was betrayed, He took bread [take common loaf into hands] And when he had blessed, and given thanks, he broke it [break the loaf] And said, "Take. Eat. Do this in remembrance of me.

After the same manner he took the cup [display the common cup] saying: "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me."

Take. Eat. This is the body of Christ which is broken for you. Do this in remembrance of him. [administer the bread]

This cup is the new covenant in the blood of Christ, which is shed for many for the remission of sins. Drink of it, all of you. [administer the cup]
