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## COURSE OVERVIEW

#### **DESCRIPTION:**

This course introduces students to the theory of Hebrew poetry, by reading selected writings on the subject, and gives them experience in reading and interpreting poetry, by reading and analyzing texts selected portions from the book of Psalms. Students will read selected writings on Hebrew poetry and analyze selected texts in the book of Psalms. These texts will then be read carefully in class.

To increase the students' love for and ability to interpret Hebrew poetry.

(Includes appropriate use of original languages and hermeneutics; and integrates theological, historical, and cultural/global perspectives.)	Strong	The focus of this class is studying the text in its original language and context.
Reformed Theology	Significant knowledge of Reformed theology and practice, with emphasis on the Westminster Standards.	Moderate	There will be some discussion of the chosen texts in the context of Reformed theology.
Sanctification	Demonstrates a love for the Triune God that aids the student's sanctification.	Strong	While reading the chosen texts, which focus on God as Creator, students will grow in their love for their triune God.

Preach	Ability to preach and teach the meaning of Scripture to both heart and mind with clarity and enthusiasm.	Moderate	There will be discussion of the structure of the texts and the application to preaching.
Worship	Knowledgeable of historic and modern Christian- worship forms; and ability to construct and skill to lead a worship service.	Moderate	There will be some discussion of the application of ancient worship forms to modern day worship.
