OT6370 Ecclesiastes

I. Course Description

Through a series of lectures (and focusing particularly on Ecclesiastes) we will consider dominant themes in the wisdom literature - Wisdom, Perspective, Time, Death, Life, Desire, Mystery - and at each point explore some of the theological issues involved in grappling with these themes. The course will seek to immerse the student in the distinctive worldview of Ecclesiastes in particular, and the wisdom literature in general, while showing how it is an integral part of biblical revelation and redemptive history which shines a light on the person and work of Christ.

II. Course Objectives

- a. *Grasp* the dominant themes of the wisdom literature
- b. Engage with some recent evangelical treatments of this literature
- c. Consider the challenges of preaching these books in a Christ-centred way effectively
- d. *Enthuse* the student for reading, preaching, teaching this often neglected literature

III. Course Requirements

- a. Prepare and submit a 1000 word summary of *any ONE* of the following three books:
 - David Gibson, Living Life Backward
 - Todd J. Billings, The End of the Christian Life
 - Matthew McCullough, Remember Death: The Surprising Path to Living Hope
- b. Prepare and submit a 1000 word summary of the strengths and weaknesses of any <u>ONE</u> of the *commentaries* below
- c. <u>Watch</u> Terence Malick's film *The Tree of Life* and <u>read</u> Peter J. Leithart's book, *Shining Glory: Theological Reflections on the Tree of Life* (in whichever

order you wish), and write a 500 word reflection on the effectiveness or otherwise of Malick's offering.

- d. Read the attached three *Desiring God* articles by David Gibson on Ecclesiastes. Sent separately. No written summary needed.
- e. All course requirements must be submitted by <u>5PM</u>, January 13th, 2023
