- **PURPOSE:**
 - To glorify God and enjoy Him! (1 CORINTHIANS 10:31)
- **GOALS:**
 1. To enhance student personal devotions in the Holy Scriptures in the original Hebrew
 2. To apply the principles of Biblical Hebrew as learned in previous courses
 3. To introduce students to the basics of text criticism
 4. To introduce students to the critical edition of the Hebrew Scriptures
 5. To prepare students for grammatico-historical exegesis of the Hebrew Scriptures
 6. To prepare students for historical-redemptive exegesis of the Hebrew Scriptures
 7. To aid in student preparations of the teaching ministry of the Hebrew Scriptures
 8. To read as much Hebrew as possible!

Includes ability to interact within a denominational context, within the broader worldwide church, and with significant public issues. Winsomely Reformed	Embraces a winsomely Reformed ethos.
