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COURSE OVERVIEW

DESCRIPTION:

This course introduces students to the theory of Hebrew narrative, by reading the Book of Ruth, and gives them experience in reading and interpreting narrative, by analyzing the Book of Ruth. During the online portion of the course, students will read selected writings on Hebrew narrative and the book of Ruth will then be read carefully in class.

PURPOSE:

To increase the students' love for and ability to interpret Hebrew prose.
