#### **Course description**

The Book of Zechariah is, on a proportional basis, the most referred to Old Testament book in the New Testament, yet it is rarely studied in the church. Zechariah contains diverse materials — apocalyptic visions, oracles of judgment, prescriptions — all of which depict the return of the glory of the Lord to his city, temple, and people through the predicted coming, suffering, and rejection of his Messianic king. The circumstances of Zechariah's world mirror closely our own — a world where things are not right, God's movement is not always visible, and hope is often in short supply. This course will provide a chapter-by-chapter study of Zechariah with a view toward its use and application in present day ministry. *2 credit hours*.

#### Course objectives

Knowing To attain a working knowledge of the content of and interpretive issues surrounding the Old Testament book of Zechariah.

Being To grow more confident in God's purpose, presence, and power as expounded by the prophet Zechariah

Doing To become more holy and just in the way you live in an "already/not-yet" world.

To be able to teach or preach through the book of Zechariah in an expositional way.

#### Weekly quizzes

Each week a brief multiple-choice Canvas quiz is due before the start of class on the date indicated. These quizzes will cover the content of the assigned passage of Zechariah for that week in order to encourage careful reading of the passage before the lecture.

#### Mid-term and final quizzes

At mid-term and at the end of the semester open-note take-at-home exams will be given covering the assigned reading and lectures. The final exam will not be cumulative, but only test the material since the mid-term exam. The exams will be based on but not limited to review questions provided at the end of each lecture handout.

#### **Exegesis project**

Students will have a choice of writing an academic research paper or design a sermon series or Sunday school class curriculum including one full lesson. The exegetical paper may be on a particular passage from or on a larger topic related to Zechariah. The sermon series or Sunday school class curriculum will include a schedule for a two-to-three-month-long study with titles and summaries for each lesson and a manuscript for one of the sermons or lessons to be taught. Specific contents of both options will be discussed in class. This project is due at the term paper deadline.

#### **Biblical languages**

Knowledge of Greek and Hebrew is not required for this course, though students who have taken either language are encouraged to use them in their exegesis project.
