COURSE OVERVIEW

Catalog Description: A continuation of Communication I. This course continues to develop the skills required for interpreting and communicating the Bible. Special emphasis is given to sermon composition, including its constituent parts, as well as to the different ecclesial contexts of sermon delivery (e.g., wedding, funerals).

Objective: To equip students for a lifetime of faithful and fruitful communication in the context of the local church.

Format: Class time will combine lectures, small group discussion, and student presentations.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- 3. Paper (20%). Write a paper to your current church that summarizes your philosophy of communication. Include discussion of your goals, approach, and preparation process. Not to exceed 2,000 words.
- **4.** Sample Preaching Schedule (20%). Prepare a preaching schedule for one full calendar year. Include dates, series, texts, and titles for every week, paying attention to the flow of the ministry year.
- **5.** *Presentation (20%).* Students will present a talk on the last day of class, incorporating learnings from the week. A full manuscript, not to exceed 3,000 words, must be submitted.
- **6.** Written Homilies (20%). Students will prepare two homilies, one for a wedding and one for a funeral. For each homily, a full manuscript, not to exceed 1,000 words, must be submitted.
