

## **Course Description.**

Pastoral Ministry (02PT5250) will lay the foundations of a biblical theology of the pastor in relation to the church and the world. Students will begin to formulate a philosophy of ministry, assess readiness, and attain progress in their calling. A variety of pastoral skills and competencies will be included. 2 hours.

- A sense of the scope of God's purposes for his people, the church, particularly as it pertains to the role of the minister.
- Overview of biblical qualifications and functions of the ministry.
- Historical survey of the office of minister of word and sacrament.
- Recognition & development of a ministry framework out of which to develop and implement a philosophy of ministry.

- Conviction regarding the church's identity and purpose.
- Conviction regarding the role of minister of word and sacrament.
- Commitment to character and gift development of a minister of word and sacrament.
- Clarity and commitment about sense of calling in relation to readiness for ministry.
- Commitment to carry out the challenges of applying biblical norms for ministry to contemporary pastoral contexts.

# **Homework Assignments**

As announced in class and posted to Canvas, homework assignments will a) reflect upon lecture, class discussion, and reading material, b) prepare for an upcoming class session, or c) simply require submission of your lecture notes for that day. All assignments must comply with the "Use of Resources" policy below.

## **Ministry Dessert & Lunch**

Evening dessert for married students. On the date announced in class, there will be an evening dessert at the Glodo home for married students and spouses with a local pastor and spouse as guests. The evening will provide married students and spouses an opportunity to interact with a ministry couple and with one another. No childcare will be provided. For those unable to attend, you may complete an alternative assignment by meeting with your pastor and his wife as a couple to ask several interview questions and to hear their wisdom and experience. Engaged couples are welcome to attend.

Lunch/breakfast for single students. On a date to be announced, there will be a breakfast or lunch provided at which single students can discuss the unique challenges and opportunities for single people in ministry.

The time required for these additional meetings will be made up by class not meeting on the date indicated in the schedule.

# **Assessment of Calling**

In a 3,000 word (+/- 500 words) single-spaced paper, answer the following questions in a way that <u>reflects comprehension of the relevant course content</u>. Specific reference should be made to relevant lectures and readings.

- What is the church's mission?
- What is my current sense of call and how will it serve the church's mission?
- What internal and external testimony bear witness to that sense of call?
- How does my self-knowledge indicate both readiness and need for growth with respect to my sense of call?
- If married, your spouse will read what you have written and provide reflections.
   Unmarried students have the option of getting similar reflection from a ministry mentor or close friend.

Following the initial submission, I will provide comments and questions which are to be answered in a brief follow-up assignment. This assignment will not be assessed on certainty and clarity of calling, but on the clarity of your reflection engaging the course material.

# **Spiritual formation project**

#### Married students—family worship.

This assignment will build your experience and conviction about family worship. Based on the instructions given in the first week's lectures and from the reading in Helopoulos and the Westminster Directory for Family Worship, you will conduct family worship at least twice per week for ten weeks. Keep a <u>brief</u> written or typed log of the following information each week:

- What specific days you had family worship.
- A description of what you did each time.

Since the purpose of this assignment is to reinforce a habit, you will not be permitted to count more sessions than two per week.

The week before fall break you will submit your log to-date with the above information and a brief assessment of what has gone well and what has been most challenging. At the term paper deadline, submit a log of the second half of the semester along with an update on the how things have gone.

This assignment will be evaluated on meeting frequency requirement and required elements of family worship (scripture, prayer, song).

#### Single students - Praying the Psalms

You are free to do the family worship assignment with a small group. If you choose to do so, please let me know. Otherwise, you will do an individual spiritual formation assignment based on Psalms.

After reading Bonhoeffer's *Psalms: Prayerbook of the Bible* and Luther's *A Simple Way to Pray*, at least twice weekly for ten weeks meditate on a psalm of your choosing and then compose a prayer that prays that psalm. For each psalm you choose, note the genre of the psalm, the primary imagery, a key verse, and a one sentence summary. Take that knowledge into consideration as you write the prayer.

This assignment is well-suited to writing by hand, but typed or handwritten submissions are acceptable. Some students may wish to consider using a tool such as the <u>ESV Scripture Journal:</u> <u>Psalms</u>. Since the purpose of this assignment is to reinforce a habit, you will not be permitted to count more than two times per week. The week before fall reading week and at the term paper deadline you will submit your work for assessment.

### Spiritual formation reading report

Depending on which of the spiritual formation assignments you do, you are to write a single-spaced 1,000 word paper (not including any samples) which does the following:

Married students - Based on Bonhoeffer's *Psalms*, write a 500-word paper for people in your church or ministry explaining what it means to pray the Psalms, why it is important, and how to go about it. Include a sample prayer.

Single students - Based on the "Directory for Family Worship" and Helopoulos' *A Neglected Grace*, write a 500-word paper for the people in your church or ministry explaining what family worship is, why it is important, and how to go about it. Include a sample.

# Computers, tablets, mobile phones, and Bibles

Smart phones should be silenced and placed out of sight during class unless you need to be available for urgent personal (e.g., you or your spouse is ≥8 months pregnant) or professional (e.g., you are a member of Seal Team 6) reasons. Please notify me ahead of time if this applies to you. All students are required to bring a printed Bible to class each week. Laptops and tablets are not permitted while class is in session. Printed outlines will be provided for each lecture.

# **Class recordings**

Students with a diagnosed learning disability or for whom English is a second language may be given access to lecture audio recordings for the entire semester. Other students who are providentially hindered from attending class may request the recordings on an as-needed basis when providing the reasons for their absence.

## **Class protocols**

Class will start promptly on the hour and break 5-10 minutes halfway through. Please arrive on time, return from break promptly, and stay seated throughout the class unless for urgent reasons you must leave quietly. You are free to stand in the back during class. If you neglect or forget these protocols, I will gently remind you of them.

#### **Use of Resources**

Students are expected to do their own original research and writing unless stipulated otherwise. Assignments must be the student's original composition except when attributed through citation (e.g. footnotes). Students may not use artificial intelligence bots, language generation models, or similar tools (e.g. Chat-GPT) for research, compilation of materials, or completion of assignments. Students will be asked at the end of the course to confirm their compliance with this policy. If you are unclear about the application of this policy, please see me.
