Catalog Course Description: This general introduction to Christianity in the early and medieval periods focuses on developments in Christian doctrine and great leaders from Justin Martyr to John Hus who made contributions of lasting significance to the Christian Church.

Course Objectives:

- To familiarize students with the emergence and growth of Christianity in the Mediterranean Graeco-Roman world and its spread from there eastward and westward. Particular emphasis is laid on the development of Christian devotion, theology and architecture in the context of Western Europe
- To gain the ability to speak and write insightfully regarding the interpretation of this history and the application of its lessons to modern Christianity
