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### Course Description:

This course provides opportunities for students to develop expository preaching skills in a variety of formats. The student will be required to preach at least two expository sermons, an extemporaneous evangelistic message, and a funeral homily.

### Course Objectives:

- To grow in the ability to create and delivery effective expository messages.
- To develop a personal style of communication and delivery.
- To demonstrate the ability to structure a message and apply it skillfully to the lives of the listeners.
- To grow in the ability to give and receive godly criticism, an essential skill for gospel ministry.

### Required Textbook:

None. This class will be focused on implementing the readings completed in Communications 06PT5100.

### Requirements:

- Attendance – All students are required to attend each class. If you must miss a class, please advise me in advance via email.
- Preaching in class – students will be required to preach in class several times. ***The number, length, and subject of each message will be determined once the class enrollment is finalized.*** Students will receive the preaching schedule on the first day of class (Lord willing). Note: students should provide the instructor with a copy of whatever notes/manuscript they take with them into the pulpit.
  - **Sermon #1** – a 20-minute expository message on a Lukan parable of the student's choosing.

- **Sermon #2** – a 20-minute expository message on a Psalm of the student's choosing. The message should cover the entire Psalm, not merely a portion of it.
- **Sermon #3** – a 20-minute expository message on an OT narrative.
- **Sermon #4** – a 15-minute funeral homily for (choose one):
  - an elderly member of your church who died after a long battle with dementia.
  - the child of members of your church. Growing up, he seemed serious about the things of the Lord. When he went to college three years ago, he seems to have walked away from his faith. He died of a drug overdose.
  - the father of a member of your church. All of the family members (with the exception of the one who is a member of your church) are nominal Christians and have no engagement with any other church but yours.
- Evaluations – each student will turn in an evaluation sheet (provided in class) for each message preached in class.
- Video reviews – each student will record their messages and watch them with his wife (if married) or a friend. He will then write a one-page summary, due at the beginning of the next class meeting.
- Sermon comparison paper (due in class on October 11<sup>th</sup>) – each student will watch or listen to a sermon preached by another preacher on the same passage as their in-class Lukan parable sermon. He will then write a paper (roughly 3,000 words) comparing his sermon to that of the other preacher and drawing out any lessons that can be applied in his preaching going forward.

### **Grading:**

- Evaluations of other students – 10%
- Video reviews – 10%
- Sermon comparison paper – 10%
