THEOLOGICAL RESEARCH AND WRITING

I. Course Summary & Objectives

- a. This is a practical theology course on theological research and writing. It will instruct the students to use the library resources in an efficient and fruitful way (the local book collection as well as on-line resources: e-books and articles databases). It will introduce the students to the habit of taking notes while reading and the habit of creating a reference tool for future sermons, Bible studies, articles or books.
- b. Communication (written and oral) is an essential skill for those who serve the Church. This course will focus on:
 - understanding the research process: locating the primary and secondary sources and organizing the fruits of the research
 - creating and maintaining bibliography
 - formulating the thesis (what to say/write)
 - validating the thesis through proper argumentation
 - employing a clear style of presentation (how to say/write)
 - using Turabian and SBL styles for writing papers
 - understanding and avoiding plagiarism.

II. Course Requirements

- a. Class Participation: includes attendance of all classes, active participation and contribution in a class discussion.
- b. Readings: There are two short books required for this course. The students are encouraged to purchase the required texts, which may serve them as references in the future writing. There will also be reading associated with the research for the term paper.
- c. Writing Assignments: There will be three writing assignments two short exercises and one research paper.
 - After careful reading of the Book of Jonah the student will express the message of the Book of Jonah in one sentence.
 - The student will write a short article (between 900 and 1200 words) presenting recent mission experience or involvement in church outreach.

• At the end of the semester, the student will have written a 12-15 page research paper on a topic approved by the instructor. The research for this paper may be used for another assignment (another course) as long as there is permission from the other professor. The paper will follow either Turabian or SBL style and will include bibliography (books, journal articles, and website postings).
