This course introduces basic tools for interpreting the Old Testament. Attention is given to a working knowledge of biblical Hebrew and to principles of interpretation.

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Assignments

- 1. **Complete** assigned Notebooks. There are 12 notebook assignments to be turned in, which will provide the opportunity for students to apply to the student's text what is taught in *Seeing the Text* and *Old Testament Exegesis*. The notebooks constitute **20%** of the final grade.
- 2. **Quizzes**. There are 12 quizzes taken weekly on Canvas that will cover assigned vocabulary from van Pelt, and assigned Hebrew verb forms. The quizzes constitute **20%** of the final grade.
- 3. **Final Exam**. The final exam will cover the Hebrew text assigned in class, quiz vocabulary, and quiz verb paradigms. The final exam constitutes **25%** of the final grade.
- 4. **Exegetical paper**. The paper will give you the opportunity to synthesize what you have learned from *Seeing the Text, Old Testament Exegesis*, and the Notebook exercises. (Consult "Guidelines for the Paper" in Canvas). The paper constitutes **30%** of the final grade. Papers are due on December 6, 2023 at 11am. Students will select their passage from one of the following texts:

1 Kings 17-18

5. **Memorization**. Over the course of the semester, students will memorize Psalm 100 in Hebrew – 5% of final grade.
