Course Purpose and Objectives

The purpose of this course is to deepen our experience and understanding of God's Word found in the Bible and its communication through the theological traditions of the Christian church. We will do this by gaining a familiarity with the Scriptures and their meaning both for the ancient audience and for the believing community acquainted with the prophetic ministry of Jesus Christ in the New Testament. This study will consider the historical witness of the Christian church, the unique contributions of the Reformed tradition, and the current state of theological study and pastoral vocation.

Students will be required to demonstrate:

- 1. a familiarity of the tri-perspectival approach to pastoral and theological studies articulated by Dr. John Frame,
- 2. a grasp of the theological issues and patterns that commonly arise in the contemporary evangelical and Reformed church, and
- 3. an ability to interpret the Scriptures in the light of Christian tradition and personal knowledge.
