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This is a HYBRID COURSE that will incorporate e-learning components prior to the on-campus class dates. Course activities start the week of November 27th. Inperson class meets MONDAY-FRIDAY 1pm-5pm, January 8th – 12th on the RTS/Orlando campus.

Summary: Students should think of the class as consisting in three parts.

Part 1: Six weeks of work required prior to in person instruction

Part 2: One week in person instruction (Jan 8-12)

Part 3: Four Weeks after in person instruction to Complete Reading, Final

Paper, and Final Exam

- **COURSE DESCRIPTION:** An expository study of the message and times of the prophets that emphasizes the themes day of the Lord, judgment, restoration, promise and fulfillment, Messiah, kingdom, and the new people of God (from course catalogue)

• REQUIREMENTS

- Attendance. Due to the intensive format of this course, students are required to attend class lectures. If you know you cannot make it to a class session, notify the professor in advance.
- Primary Reading. Read all Biblical books of Isaiah to Malachi in your preferred translation. This reading constitutes 10% of the final grade.
- Secondary Reading. Read all the textbooks; this reading constitutes 5% of the final grade. See the "Reading Report" Form below.
- Remote Lectures and Discussion Posts/Replies. Listen to Lectures (see schedule below). In Canvas, make four posts to the discussion boards of at least 250 words. Additionally, make at least three replies to other students' posts with at least 100 words. These posts constitute 15% of the final grade.
- o *Final paper*. Write an exegetical or theological paper (2500 words). This paper will constitute **35%** of the term grade. Students who have taken Hebrew must write an exegetical paper. Paper requirements will be discussed in person during hybrid week.
- o *Final Exam*. Students will take a final exam that covers the lecture material and readings. This exam will constitute **35%** of the final grade.

RESEARCH PAPER

Students will write one research paper from one of the options provided below. This will be turned into the instructor via email by Feb 9, 2024.

- ☐ **Options** #1: Hebrew Exegetical Paper.
 - ✓ If you have had Biblical Hebrew, you are **required** to do this research paper assignment.
 - ✓ In this paper, you need to state clearly the <u>thesis of the paper</u> and organize the paper using literary, linguistic, historical-cultural, and/or theological arguments to defend it. The bulk of your paper is to be a <u>verse-by-verse</u> exposition that shows how your passage is connected to your thesis. You are also to show the historical-redemptive themes in the passage. Minimal to no materials should focus on introductory matters (date, authorship, etc.), unless it is absolutely warranted.
 - ✓ Provide your English translation of the text as the first page of your paper. Provide notes to your translation regarding textual emendations, text critical analysis, and variant readings.
 - ✓ You are required to provide a bibliography as the last page of your paper and must cite at least 8 academic or scholarly references for the paper (internet sites, blogs, notes from study bibles, and sermons are not to be used).
 - ✓ Passages to choose from:
 - o Isaiah 11:1-10
 - **Zechariah 14:1-9**
- □ **Option #2**: Biblical Theological analysis of the theme of the "Day of the Lord" in the Prophets.
 - ✓ You are required to provide a bibliography as the last page of your paper and must cite at least 8 references for the paper.

Grading Criteria: A successful paper will conform to the following standards.

- **Thesis**: The thesis is well stated without any ambiguity and reflects accurately the message/theology of the passage/theme in question. **10 points.**
- Organization: The paper is well organized and thoughtful in its presentation. The structure of the paper flows from the thesis and the paragraphs interconnect seamlessly where the author's development of thought can be clearly seen. 20 points.
- Content: 40 points (5 for each bulletin point below)
 - 1. *Comprehension*: The paper shows a command of the subject matter and an academic and scholarly level of analysis that is insightful and fresh.
 - 2. *Argumentation*: The arguments used to defend and/or describe the thesis were persuasive.
 - 3. *Relevance*: The paper shows an understanding of the current issues with the theme/paper in question.
 - 4. *Bible*: The paper interacts with the relevant Biblical materials (in the original language) and demonstrates a thorough comprehension of the theme/passage in its grammatical-historical context (**10 points**)
 - 5. *Originality*: Although originality is desired, a new contribution is not always a necessary ingredient in a successful academic paper.
 - 6. *Resources*: The paper interacts with a variety (ancient and modern, commentaries, monographs, journal articles) of relevant and useful resources, which are used to enhance the thesis of the paper not substitute for it.
 - 7. *Integrity*: There is no question about plagiarism or any other dishonest or academically questionable activity.
- **Style**: The writing style is *cogent* (logical), *clear* (easy to understand), and *concise* (stating thoughts without redundancy, or treading into irrelevant materials). **10 points.**
- **Proof-read**: There are no spelling errors or run on sentences. **10 points.**
- **Logistics**: The paper meets the minimum page requirement, minimum resources in bibliography. The pages are numbered. Formatting of the paper follows the guidelines found in either *The Chicago Manual of Style* (15th ed.; Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 2003) or *The SBL Handbook of Style* (Peabody, MA: Hendrickson, 1999). **10 points.**
