#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This course introduces the student to various missional motivations as they relate to the Christian ministry, including: identity and purpose, biblical/theological motivations, historical understanding, and strategic practical application. Our goal is to learn, in order to reach; to rediscover God's plan for his people until he returns. The emphasis of the course is on Spiritual formation that cultivates a burden for Kingdom advance, while stimulating a heart for God's people. The course considers the following questions: Who are the people of God and what is their purpose? How is that purpose carried out? What does the mission of God's people have to do with God's glory, the edification (building up) of the church, and the salvation and transformation of the local and global unconverted?

#### **COURSE GOALS**

- 1. To enable the student to articulate and live out a Biblical theology of mission.
- 2. To enable the student to better understand the biblical/theological mandate of world evangelization, discipleship, and building missional communities/local churches.
- 3. To introduce the student to the history and personalities, major and minor, of Christian mission.
- 4. To prepare the student for cross cultural engagement, genuinely speaking truth in love.
- 5. To inspire a passion in the student for the transformative, life altering Biblical Gospel; to ignite a heart for local and world mission that will bear fruit both in the greater worldwide mission task and in the hearts of individual believers.
- 6. To equip the student with practical skills that will encourage spiritual formation that includes a heart for mission as an integral part of their own disciple-making process.
- 7. To acquaint the student with the various resources and agencies available for continued growth and participation in world missions.

#### **FORMAT**

Interactive lectures from professor, possible guest lecturers, small group interactions, seminars, video presentations, and/or discussions.

#### **ASSIGNMENTS:**

There will be three writing assignments, each due once per week in this month-long intensive course. In each assignment, the student is expected to show (1) significant Scriptural and theological reflection (2) integration of lecture and discussion material and (3) critical thinking, personal reflection, and conclusions.

# Project 1: (30% of grade).

Interview: Have a gracious conversation with a member of one non-Christian world religions (Muslim, Hindu, Buddhism, Judaism, Atheist, Bahai, Sikh, etc.) and write one-page report about your experience: How they understand the nature and character of God, man, their world purpose, how devout they perceive themselves to be, have they held to a different faith in the past, etc). Write a paper on this experience. (1000 – 1500 words double spaced or 4-5 pages). It is expected that this paper will be marked by a solid introduction and conclusion(s), a clear outline, solid argumentation, and a quality writing style with proper citation of multiple sources. Due Date 1/31/22.

# Project 2: (30% of grade).

Students will **thoughtfully participate in ten** (10) **written student-to-student online discussion** questions. These discussions will occur via Canvas and will be based on course readings and lectures. **Due Date 1/31/22.** 

# **Project 3: Choose only one of the following (40% of grade):**

3a.

Write a review of the essay of your choice from *The Trinity Among the Nations: The Doctrine of God in the Majority World* (3000 words double spaced or 10 pages). It is expected that this paper will be marked by a solid introduction and conclusion(s), a clear outline, solid argumentation, and a quality writing style with proper citation of any sources. Due Date 1/31/22.

OR

3b.

Write an essay on a missionary from the list below. This essay will include a brief biographical and ministry sketch, challenges faced on his/her particular mission field, and an honest assessment (including critique) of his/her contributions to world missions in light of the missionary's personality traits, strengths, weaknesses, mistakes, theological errors, methodology of their sending agency (if any), etc. (40% of grade). This essay should be approximately 10 pages (3000 words) and should be:

- written on one of the missionaries listed below, but multiple other sources must be consulted for additional insights and evaluations.
- should integrate material discussed in class, as well as reading assignments.
- should be marked by a solid introduction and conclusion(s), a clearly articulated outline, solid argumentation, and a quality writing style with proper citation of sources.
