COURSE DESCRIPTION: An examination of the literary structure, themes, and history of the Psalms and wisdom literature of the Old Testament.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Comprehension:

- 1. To increase your knowledge of the English Bible of the books Job-Song of Songs.
- 2. To increase your understanding of the message(s) of the books Job-Song of Songs, both separately and together.
- 3. To introduce the basic trends in scholarly research regarding these books.

Competence:

- 1. To sharpen your ability to understand and interpret Hebrew Poetry.
- 2. To sharpen your ability to interpret the books Job-Song of Songs in their historical, theological, and literary contexts.
- 3. To sharpen your ability to teach and preach the books Job-Song of Songs in the context of the local church.
- 4. To prepare those called to pastoral ministry for licensure and ordination exams at their local church assemblies and examination boards.

Character:

- 1. To sharpen your application of the themes of the books Job-Song of Songs in your personal spiritual life.
- 2. To be a person of growing faith, hope, and love based on the work of God as revealed in these books.

REQUIREMENTS:

Attendance: Students are required to attend class lectures and discussions. If you know you cannot make it to a portion of a class session, notify the instructor in advance. Given the weekend format of this class, students are not permitted to miss a full weekend.

Reading: Students should complete all readings according to the course schedule below.

Hourly Examinations: Three take-home hourly exams will be distributed to be done in the evening. Each exam will be due at the beginning of the next class. The final hourly will be due Jan. 26 at 6:00 PM. Each hourly will be closed book, and the student will have 1 hour to take the exam. Hourlies 1 and 2 may be submitted as a .pdf file to the course website on Canvas or brought to class as a physical copy. Hourly 3 should be submitted as a .pdf file to the course website on Canvas. These hourly examinations are not intended to be difficult, but they will require the student to demonstrate basic proficiency in the skills taught in the previous day's class.

Paper: Students who have taken Hebrew are required to write an exegetical paper for this class. Students who have not taken Hebrew may instead write a theological paper. Papers should be 15-20 pages, double-spaced and should interact both with the material discussed in class sessions and the secondary readings. Additional research is required for these papers and must be demonstrated both in the paper itself and in its bibliography.

- Exegetical Paper: Students may submit an exegetical paper on one of the following passages: Psalm 24, Proverbs 3:13-26, or Job 19:23-27. If a student wishes to do a different passage, it should be approved by the instructor. (N.B.: This is for your benefit to keep you from biting off more than you can chew!)
- Theological Paper: Students should email the instructor by Jan. 24 with a one-page paper proposal for approval.

This paper will be due Feb. 28 at 5:00 PM by submission on Canvas. The paper should be submitted as a .pdf file. Please include your name as part of the file name.

Note: Students who are interested in doing **additional graduate study** beyond their RTS degree **MUST** contact the instructor in advance, as these requirements may be adjusted to better prepare the student for his or her future course of study.

TOTAL GRADE:

The final grade for the course will be determined as follows:

Hourly Examinations: 50%

Paper: 50%

Grades will be assigned according to the RTS grading system. The instructor reserves the right to adjust grades based on each student's attendance at class and participation in classroom discussion.

ZOOM POLICY:

Your professor may allow you to Zoom into class or watch Zoom recordings for excused absences based on the professor's discretion and subject to the availability of equipment. Students should contact their professor well in advance of the class meeting. For a third absence the Registrar should be consulted. Your professor may require additional interactive assignments to offset the absence of classroom interaction. Sync or Remote Live courses have priority for the limited Zoom equipment.

EXTENSION POLICY:

All assignments and exams are to be completed by the deadlines announced in this syllabus or in class.

Extensions for assignments and exams due within the normal duration of the course must be approved beforehand by the Professor. Extensions of two weeks or less beyond the date of the last deadline for the course must be approved beforehand by the Professor. A grade penalty may be assessed.

Extensions of greater than two weeks but not more than six weeks beyond the last deadline for the course may be granted in extenuating circumstances (i.e. illness, family emergency). For an extension of more than two weeks the student must request an Extension Request Form from the Registrar's Office. The request must be approved by the Professor and the Academic Dean.
