# **Principles of Leadership: Daniel, Esther and Nehemiah**

## **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This course examines the people of God during their time as a cultural minority in Babylonian exile, with special consideration also given to their forms of leadership under Persian rule.

During Israel's captivity in Babylon, the focus is on the faithful leadership of Daniel, Hananiah, Mishael and Azariah — how they navigated the cultural dynamics and stresses they faced as the Babylonians attempted to neutralize their prophetic witness — how the global purposes of God were accomplished through them.

The course also covers select readings from Esther (TBA) and considers the leadership of Esther and Mordecai over the Jews in Persia as they face rising hostility and potential genocide.

The time of transition from exile is also covered under the wise leadership of Nehemiah — how the restoration of God's people was derailed by oppression and how he empowered them to overcome and recover from it.

Attention is given to the political, economic, social and theological events during their times (the  $6^{th}$  and  $5^{th}$  Centuries B.C.) and how these events speak to us today.

**COURSE OBJECTIVES** — At the end of the course, the student should be able to:

1. Articulate the major historical events in the Middle East during the 6<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> Centuries B.C.

- 2. Communicate how biblical leadership differs from its non-biblical counterpart.
- 3. Explain how the dynamics of leadership differ between dominant and sub-dominate perspectives.
- 4. Identify the major forces of opposition to leadership that is biblically defined.
- 5. Discuss how the people of God have been a cultural minority throughout most of history.
- 6. Elaborate on the nature of surrounding culture pressures biblically oriented leaders to conform to their agenda.
