This course takes an expository approach to the major developments in the history of redemption: creation, covenant, promise, and fulfillment of the promises. This portion of the biblical revelation covers the period from Adam and Even in the Garden of Eden to the second giving of the Law.

### **ASSIGNMENTS**

1. **Read** all Biblical books in English and all the textbooks. These readings constitute 20% of the final grade.

- 2. **Remote Lectures and Discussion Posts/Replies.** Listen to Lectures (see schedule below). In Canvas, make five posts to the discussion boards of at least 250 words. Additionally, make at least one response to other students' posts with at least 100 words. These posts constitute 10% of the final grade.
- 3. **Biblical book summaries**. Students must write one-page summaries of each of the biblical books covered in the course, including the historical context, a very basic outline (general arc of the book, not chapter-by-chapter) and key themes of each book. Summaries constitute 30% of the final grade.
- 4. **Final exam.** This will cover lectures and the reading. The final exam constitutes 40% of the final grade.
