Course Description

This course constitutes an introduction to the language of Biblical (Classical) Hebrew, including basic phonology, morphology, syntax, and vocabulary. Hebrew 1 counts for three (3) credit hours and Hebrew 2 counts for three (3) credit hours. The total for the summer course sequence is six (6) credit hours. No prerequisites.

- 2. Attendance and Late Assignments. Language acquisition can be a difficult task and requires constant vigilance in the beginning stages. Students are required to be ready and in their seats by 12:55 PM. If you miss a quiz, it may not be made up. You may, however, take a quiz early if you need to miss a day. In the instance of a missed quiz, it is helpful to know that students will drop their two lowest quiz scores during the summer term.
- 3. **Method of Instruction**. The emphasis in this class is student performance. Students must come to class each day prepared and ready to participate in the instructional process. This means that all of the assigned reading from the grammar and all of the assigned homework from the workbook must be completed by the beginning of the class period for which it is assigned. Failure to comply will inhibit acceptable performance and impede the benefit of the classroom experience for other students.
- 4. **Special Needs**. In order to ensure full class participation, any student with a condition requiring special accommodations (e.g. voice recorders, special adaptive equipment) is strongly encouraged to contact the professor at the beginning of the course.
- 5. Electronic Aids. No computers, recording devices, or electronics are permitted in class.
- 6. **Disclaimer**. This syllabus is intended to reflect the learning objectives, instructional format, and other information necessary for students to appraise the course. However, during the course of the semester, the instructor reserves the right to modify any portion of this syllabus if deemed necessary for the improvement of the class.

Course Requirements

- 1. **Homework**. Homework will be assigned each night. Students are expected to complete all assigned work each day in order to be prepared for class. Homework is not collected or graded. The completion of homework is, however, essential for achieving proficiency in the language.
- 2. **Quizzes**. There will be a quiz each day of the week (except during scheduled exams). These quizzes will focus on the information learned during the previous day. However, due to the very nature of learning a language, quizzes are cumulative. There are no make-up quizzes, but the lowest two quizzes will be dropped. Total quiz scores constitute 80% of the term grade.
- 3. **Tests**. There will be two major examinations this summer term (see schedule below). All exams are cumulative. Total exam scores constitute 30% of the term grade (Exam 1 = 5%; Exam 2 = 15%).
- 4. **Class Attendance**. Attendance is required. Regular absence or chronic lateness to class will result in the reduction of the course grade.
