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### **Course Description**

The purpose of this course is to help prepare you to “do the work of an evangelist” (2 Timothy 4:5). The class will explore the doctrines, lifestyle, and methods necessary for biblical evangelism.

### **Course Topics**

- To understand the biblical doctrine of evangelism.
- To explore the pastor/evangelist’s piety and character.
- To help equip the pastor/evangelist for pulpit evangelism.
- To help equip the pastor/evangelist for personal evangelism.
- To examine strategies for congregational evangelism.
- To develop responses to common objections to the gospel.

### **Course Requirements**

1. Reflection Papers (40% of final grade): You will write a reflection *God-Centered Evangelism (due February 20)*, *Compel Them to Come In (due March 7)*, and *Evangelism (due March 21)*, and *You Will Be My Witnesses (due May 1)*. No title page is necessary. Papers should be 1.5 spaced, one-inch margins on all sides, Times New Roman 12-point font, with name and date in the upper right-hand corner. Include the word count at the end of your paper. We will not accept papers that exceed the word count. See the due date extension policy below.

In your paper, devote a single brief paragraph to summarizing the contents of the book. The remainder of your paper will be spent identifying takeaways that will contribute to your understanding of the doctrine of evangelist and your commitment to doing the work of evangelist.

2. Personal Evangelism Report (25% of final grade): The best way to learn how to evangelize is to evangelize. There is no substitute for hands-on experience. Therefore, each student will pursue six different individuals with the truth of the gospel, and then record their experience in a “Personal Evangelism Report.” The Report will consist of six entries, each about three hundred words that describes the conversation: “How did it occur? What were the objections and responses to Christ’s gospel? Were you confident in the conversation? What was difficult about it?” The “Personal Evangelism Report” must be completed **by 11:59 pm, May 2**.

3. Memorization Final Exam (20% of final grade): You will memorize the following eight scripture passages: Isaiah 53:4-6, John 14:6, John 17:3, Acts 16:31, 1 Corinthians 15:3-4, 2 Corinthians 5:2, Ephesians 2:1, Ephesians 2:8-10.

4. Reading Report (15% of final grade). All reading materials should be read in their entirety. You will indicate the percentage of the reading completed **by 11:59 pm, May 1**, by completing the “Reading Report” assignment in Canvas. The assignment consists of one question asking you to indicate the total percentage of reading completed.

### **Additional Class Rules and Information**

1. Class attendance is mandatory. Attendance is taken at each class. If a student anticipates an unavoidable absence, he should notify the TA in advance. Each unexcused absence subjects the student to reduction of his final grade by a full letter grade.

2. All written work must be posted on Canvas in pdf format by 11:59 p.m. Central Time on the due date. **Do not e-mail your papers to the TA or instructors.**

3. Due date extension policy. There will be no extensions granted for any assignments. Any late submissions will be assessed a penalty of 10 points per day late.
