### Course Description

This course constitutes an introduction to the language of Biblical (Classical) Hebrew, including basic phonology, morphology, syntax, and vocabulary. 3 credit hours. Prerequisites: successful completion of Hebrew 1.

### Course Protocols

1. **Grading Schedule.** The letter grading scale for this course is summarized below.

2. **Attendance and Late Assignments.** Language acquisition can be a difficult task and requires constant vigilance in the beginning stages. Students are required to be ready and logged into the Zoom meeting by 12:59 PM. Generally, there are no make up quizzes. You may, however, take a quiz early if you need to miss a day. In the instance of a missed quiz, it is helpful to know that students will drop their lowest quiz during the term.
3. **Method of Instruction.** The emphasis in this class is student performance. Students must come to class each day prepared and ready to participate in the instructional process. This means that all of the assigned reading from the grammar and all of the assigned homework from the workbook must be completed by the beginning of the class period for which it is assigned. Failure to comply will inhibit acceptable performance and impede the benefit of the classroom experience for other students.
4. **Special Needs.** In order to ensure full class participation, any student with a disabling condition requiring special accommodations (e.g. voice recorders, special adaptive equipment) is strongly encouraged to contact the professor at the beginning of the course.
5. **Electronic Aids.** Because of the nature of the course, students will need a computer with internet access and a camera for the remote live Zoom meetings.
6. **Disclaimer.** This syllabus is intended to reflect the learning objectives, instructional format, and other information necessary for students to appraise the course. However, during the course of the semester, the instructor reserves the right to modify any portion of this syllabus as may appear necessary.

## Course Requirements

1. **Homework.** Homework will be assigned each week from the course workbook. The homework is not graded or collected, but it is expected to be completed. The homework assignments in the course workbook are designed to drill you in the information that will appear on the weekly quizzes. Doing the homework will save your bacon!
2. **Quizzes.** There will be a quiz each week (except during scheduled exams). These quizzes will focus on the information learned during that week. However, due to the very nature of learning a language, quizzes are cumulative. There are no make-up quizzes, but the lowest quiz will be dropped. Total quiz scores constitute 60% of the term grade.
3. **Tests.** There will be three major examinations during the term (see schedule below). All exams are cumulative. Total exam scores constitute 40% of the term grade (Exam 1 = 15%; Exam 2 = 15%; Exam 3 = 10% of the total course grade).
4. **Class Attendance.** Attendance is required. Regular absence or chronic lateness to class will result in the reduction of the course grade.
